

# ESW Open Seminar Series



Thatcherism offered a promise of future prosperity based on unleashing the young man's ambition, whilst its 'Victorian values' sought to retrieve a moral past.

Literary depictions of Thatcherism make the child central to a resulting contradiction between imagined moral past and ecstatically materialistic future.

In this seminar, Dr Dean traces how this contradiction is explored and parodied in major literary works on Thatcherism from Ian McEwan, Peter Ackroyd, Hanif Kureishi, and Alan Hollinghurst. The common thread in these novels is that Thatcherite materialism leads - unintentionally and ironically - to unacceptable ambitions in the child; the child indulged by Thatcherism becomes its undoing.

Dr Dean will read this theme across from literature to the political and cultural history of the long Thatcherism, its current legacy, and the complex history of Thatcherism and childhood. In the Q&A following his presentation, there will be a chance to further explore the resonances between literary, cultural, and political history.
